As we approach the Easter break, it has been a very busy term for our staff and students and we look forward to this chance to relax and renergise!

Work continues however during the Easter break for Years 11 and 13 who will be focusing on revision for their public examinations, as well as Year 10 who will sit mock examinations when we return. This term Mrs Grundy has been training staff and students in scientifically proven revision strategies. News Week Activities - School Newspaper



Monday 4th March saw the English faculty undertake a newspaper focus week, culminating in the creation of our first school newspaper.

Throughout the week, students of all ages were challenged to reflect on their personal relationship with the press, and contemplate the ongoing issues that the press face. Discussions ranged from the criminalisation of fake news, to the personal responses of students to examples of this misleading information. Alongside this,

Year 7 and 8 students undertook a detailed lesson on the issues surrounding the news; considering what the news is, how stories become 'news worthy', and how to characterise 'fake news' as an ongoing problem in contemporary society.

On Thursday 7th March, a select group of Year 8 students were tasked with the challenge of creating a newspaper, from sourcing stories and reliable information, to interviewing, drafting, and publishing their final pieces. All of the students worked incredibly hard to complete the task, making the St Paul's community incredibly proud of their exemplary effort and professionalism throughout the creation of the Newspaper.

The overall aim of the activity was to tackle the ongoing issue of the contemporary media and give students the information and tools they need to keep themselves safe. With heightened access to the internet, young people are increasingly vulnerable to misleading information, and the week's activities have sought to put ideas in place to help further protect them.

Key updates and Reminders for parents

- Thank you to all parents who observe our important requests not to drive on to the school site before 3.30pm if picking students up in the afternoon. Those who still do (and I'm sorry to say that there are some) create difficulties for the buses to move freely up and down the drive and compromise safety of staff and students as a result.
- I would respectfully remind all parents and carers of the schools' uniform expectations which, as ever, are clearly laid out on the school website.
- A recent local circular has highlighted the dangers of wearing lanyards in the front seats of cars where airbags have been deployed as the result of an accident. If your child is a passenger or, in the case of some of our sixth formers, drive their own cars to school, please do not wear your lanyard if you are in the front seat.
- **Cyber security**: From Friday 10th May, students will not be able to use USB sticks or hard drives in school. This is due to new laws about confidentiality (GDPR) and cyber security advice. Please encourage your child to save all their work to the school's OneDrive, a very secure site, over the Easter holidays. A step by step guidance sheet will be on the school website shortly to advise students how to upload their work to the OneDrive. If your child is taking an exam this Summer, please ensure that all the relevant work is copied onto the OneDrive
- Polite reminder, our school day starts at 8:45am. If your child arrives after the register is closed they will be marked as an unauthorised absence. The significance of this is that high levels of unauthorised absences will result in a referral to the Educational Welfare Service which could lead to legal action being taken, resulting in a fine.

I hope that you and your family have a relaxing and joyful Easter break, and I look forward to welcoming our students and staff back, ready to take on the new Pentecost term.
