## Dear Parents, Carers and Friends of St Paul's

I am very pleased to share with you the highlights of this term at St Paul's.

We were proud to start this academic year with our Upper School Awards in September, and just as proud to finish with our Lower School Awards on our Feast Day in June!

Two Awards stand out as representing the core values we strive for: St Barnabas Trophy and St Paul's Trophy. Congratulations to Mia who, in addition to winning the Drama Award, was nominated for the St Barnabas Trophy, the second highest award for a Lower School student. St Barnabas was the companion of St Paul, who helped him complete his missionary journeys. His name means 'Son of encouragement'. As Mia's nomination highlights, this award is given to a student who embodies the values and spirit of St Paul's school, and this came across strongly with Mia being described as 'living out the school's ethos in everything she does, encouraging everyone in school to do their best and helping to build up the community'.



Congratulations also to Mansi who won both the Humanities Award and St Paul's Trophy - the highest award for a Lower School student in school. Her nomination described her as a student who 'always looks for the solution. Without failure she considers the wellbeing of others in her community first and takes a personal responsibility to improve the life of all in our community at any opportunity. She continuously tries to improve herself, works hard and pushes herself to achieve in everything she does. She truly lives out the words of our school prayer- to act justly, love with care and tenderness and walk humbly with their God.'

We were very fortunate to have Kevin Seaward, Olympian Marathon runner, as our Keynote speaker. He shared his journey to success from a school boy in Belfast coming second last in his school's cross country run, to being a member of the Irish Marathon Team in the 2016 Olympics, and gaining an impressive 4<sup>th</sup> place in the 2018 Commonwealth Games, beating his target of finishing in the top 10. Kevin's advice to our students was to find what they are passionate about, work hard at it with determination and grit, and crucially, to keep making small, yet important changes to their attitude and motivation. Our students were very much inspired by Kevin, who showed that big, dramatic changes aren't necessarily the key to success!

Activities Day on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> July was a huge success in so many ways! Helped by beautiful weather and a range of competitive activities ranging from yogaball volleyball, human noughts and crosses and handball, tutor groups competed against each other for the coveted year group trophies. We were very proud of our Year 10 PE Sports Leaders who took a major role in the event, as part of their Leadership course and our group of dancers. Of course, the day is not only about enjoyment, it also aims to support the ethos of St. Paul's where students competed for 'Respect Points', providing all with a clear message that sports is about team work, cooperation and good sportsmanship and our students, as always, rose to the challenge.

A tremendously inspirational speaker, Gemma from the charity MOVE against Cancer, spoke about her sporting life, and the challenges she has had to face and deal with. Thanks to the generosity of our families we raised £506 for this worthy charity, one for which a number of students and their families have received support from. Planning an event of this scale with such precision takes a lot of hard work behind the scenes, so special thanks goes to all the PE Team.



Last week our Year 10 students were very busy out of school exploring their 'World of Work'. During the course of the week they met a variety of professionals who shared details of their job roles, visited a number of different industries, learned about banking, budgeting and tax and worked together as a team to deliver a "Dragon's Den" style pitch for a 3-day music festival in Leicester. The final day on Friday was an opportunity to gain experience volunteering – 80 Year 10 students ran St Paul's' Activities Day in school while the remaining students visited three different parks across the city supporting the City Council with maintaining and developing our green spaces.

During the week, many of the professionals commented on the quality of the questions that they were asked as well as the respect and positivity shown by Year 10. The students displayed tremendous teamwork, communication, delegation and creativity for the "Dragon's Den" pitches, which made the decision as to who won, very difficult... many congratulations to the creators of the 'Culturise' festival, designed to celebrate the diversity within Leicester's community.





Again, this event took many hours over the year to plan and set up, and so I would like to thank our Careers Team, Taz and Steven along with Mrs Poccesschi and Mrs Walsh for their hard work. My thanks go also to the staff who supported our students throughout the week in the various 'World of Work' activities, and our Year 10 students for taking part with such enthusiasm and respect. The final word goes to Mrs Walsh, their Progress Leader: 'I cannot say that I have ever been prouder of them – their attitude and commitment to the week was superb.'

Staff and students from year 9 and 10 were treated to, in the words of one of the audience, 'an utterly inspirational talk, truly worthy of Davis Attenborough' from a representative of Cape-ED. They learnt about life as a Marine Biologist, how to interact with any form of wildlife they encounter and the

importance of looking after the environment we live in. They were encouraged to look at their disposable plastic waste usage and were challenged to make changes to their daily routines. Inspired by this, Year 10 students are already looking at ways to positively impact our environment by reducing the amount of single use plastic in school. They plan to work with staff and students from across the school to identify areas where we can make a real difference and improve our sustainability.
