	If a parent or carer insists on a pupil attending your school, you can take the decision to refuse the pupil if, in your reasonable judgement, it is necessary to protect other pupils and staff from possible infection with COVID-19. Your decision would need to be carefully considered in light of all the circumstances and current public health advice.		
Positive LFD	Everyone with a positive LFD test should self-isolate, they will also need to get a PCR test to check if they have Covid-19. While waiting for the PCR result the individual should continue to self-isolate. If a pupil has a positive lateral flow test and then has a negative PCR test within 2 days of the positive Lateral flow result, then the PCR test result overrides the self-test lateral flow result and they can return to school as long as they aren't displaying any Covid -19 related symptoms. School should seek public health advice if anyone in their setting has been admitted to hospital with Covid-19.	Isolation period is 10 days. The isolation period includes the day symptoms started (or the day your test was taken in the case of no symptoms), and the next 10 full days. If testing positive for the Omicron variant, the affected person and their household members & contacts are to self-isolate for 10 days (regardless of vaccination status), and household members & contacts are encouraged to take a PCR test. If the test result is positive for Alpha or Delta variants, those who are household members or contacts of the affected person and who are fully double vaccinated do not need to self-isolate.	30/11/21
Local outbreak	Settings will continue to have a role in working with health protection teams in the case of a local outbreak. If there is an outbreak a director of public health might advise a setting to temporarily introduce some control measures. Schools may want to consider extra action if: • Five children or staff who are likely to have mixed closely test positive within a period of 10 days • 10% of children and staff who are likely to have mixed closely test positive within a period of 10 days Any back to school testing does not count towards these thresholds. Outbreak Management Plan	If you have several confirmed cases within 14 days, you may have an outbreak. In the event of a Covid outbreak within a school setting Public Health will advise on a case by case basis whether or not additional measures are required and will identify what these measures will be.	All schools should have an outbreak management plan. Any measures should be kept to the minimum number of groups possible and for the shortest time possible. Extra action could mean: Improving ventilation where this would not significantly impact thermal comfort One-off enhanced cleaning focussing on touch points and shared equipment Holding activities such as exercise or assemblies outdoors Only when the public health is involved: Temporarily reinstating face coverings Re-instating on-site LFD testing Increased frequency of testing Only in extreme cases and as a last resort, schools may be advised to introduce short-term attendance restrictions such as sending home a class or year group. Good hygiene	You should continue to ensure that pupils clean their hand regularly "Catch it, Bin it, Kill it" continues to be very important for respiratory hygiene.	Make sure that you have hand towels and handwash checked and replaced as needed. Check hand sanitiser.	
PPE	Most staff will not require PPE beyond what they would normally need for work.		

Cleaning	You should maintain an appropriate cleaning schedule. The guidance advises on two cleans per day but this is a minimum requirement and some areas may require cleaning more thoroughly depending upon use and pedestrian flow. (cleaning measures may also require enhancing in the event of a Covid -19 outbreak but these will be discussed as part of the Public Health risk assessment process to control that outbreak.) Ventilation	It is important to ensure that rooms are well ventilated and that a comfortable teaching environment is maintained. You should identify any poorly ventilated spaces and take steps to improve fresh air flow in these areas, giving particular consideration when holding events where visitors such as parents are on site, for example, school plays.	Opening external windows can improve ventilation, and in addition, opening internal doors (not fire doors) can also assist with creating a throughput of air. You should balance the need for increased ventilation while maintaining a comfortable temperature. Windows will be opened more fully during breaks to purge the air in the space.	
	Inform parents if you relax school policy to allow for pupils to wear warm in colder months. The Government will provide Carbon Dioxide monitors to all schools during the Autumn term.	Consider using CO2 monitors to check air quality in poorly ventilated rooms. When the monitor indicates open windows and doors till monitor returns to normal.
