- Are humans born into original sin?

DCT gives us an insight into how things have changed in the Churches history and how they might be likely to change in the future. Christianity has always been full of debate since its very beginning. These debates often focus around the fundamental principles of Christianity including the nature of God, the nature of humans, the concept of life after death and many more. These differences in the fundamental beliefs are important as the rest of the religious teaching depends on how we answer these questions. For example, if human beings are not free to make their own choices then how can they be held accountable for their actions at the final judgement? Similarly, what need is there to behave like Christ if we can reject the idea of after life? Essentially, we are looking at how these different beliefs impact the way in which Christianity is lived out in the world.
